
WINTER NEWSLETTER

Dear Member,

Did you spot the mistake in the last Newsletter? I inadvertently headed it "Summer", when, of course it should have been "Autumn". Put it down to old age!

Another season has come to a close, and the Roberts engine has been put to bed, snug under coats of oil to keep away the dreaded rust. The old lady has performed well all year, and the new high pressure gland seals seem to have bedded-in nicely. We are also very pleased with the drum recorder which was put into operation this season and which shows us that the engine is running at a smooth and constant speed.

We are now daring to believe that it will not be too long before the Bradley Project is complete with the Smith Bros. and Eastwood engine turning in steam for the first time since 1978! The flywheel is secured and running practically dead true. Of course, it can only be turned with the bar at the moment - which is very hard work, and needs a strong person to use it. The eccentric rods have been put on, and the governor ropes too, although they were so tight that we thought it well-nigh impossible. The connecting-rod is in place but there is a bit of fitting to do with the big-end shell. Once that is sorted out, we will turn our attention to the valve timing. We have got all the insulation material for the steam pipes, and depending on the weather for the outside sections, hope to get that in place this winter. After that, dare I say, it will be all systems "Go"?





It all started with a vision on a piece of paper and a pile of bits on the garage floor (Ed.)

The Cornish boiler has been flued out and the water side cleaned. The welded seams where the new plating was attached in 1996, has to have its ten year tests before next season, and the seams have been cleaned up with a "scale buster" - which is a very noisy contraption, but makes a good job. Apart from Arnold, Richard, Aidy and Tim, particular praise must be given to Ian M and Phil R who grovelled in the flues and inside the boiler itself and did such a magnificent job. To see that pair emerge into the open from the wet and filthy nether regions was a sight to behold! We now have to wait until just into the New Year to discover if the tests will reveal any remedial work. We are praying that it will not be the case.



Going back to the Bradley Project for a moment I should mention that, although the work on the engine is nearing completion, the building itself needs some attention. That means applying for grants again. I have been assured by a representative of one grant source that we stand a good chance of a successful application but we will have to find additional funding to go with it. Next year, we will see what we can obtain.



In the meantime, we try to put a little money aside pending a final outcome.

Lancashire County Hall in its wisdom, is to close a total of five museums - in addition to libraries, etc.. Most shocking of all is the decision to close Queen Street Mill at Burnley. As you may know, Queen Street is the only complete, steampowered textile weaving mill in the world! It is to be "mothballed', but because it is scheduled, must be maintained in a secure and dry condition.
